CANADA GOOSE

Family Anatidae
Species Branta canadensis
Common name Canada Goose
Status Introduced
Abundance Common

Size 830 mm (cf sparrow 145 mm, Black Swan 1200 mm)

Habitat A bird of lakes, wetlands and open countryside.

Worldwide range A North American species introduced into New Zealand as a game bird. Also introduced to the UK. In New Zealand it has established large populations in the South Island where they breed in the seclusion of the high country and winter nearer the coast. In the North Island populations are expanding.

New Zealand range Found throughout most of New Zealand.

Description

Head and neck Black. **Face** Prominent white patch under eye to chin. **Upperparts** Brownish. **Breast and underparts** Greyish-brown barred with white. **Uppertail** Black with white under. **Bill** Black. **Legs and feet** Dark grey.

Conspicuous features

- The contrasting black and white on the head.
- Greyish-brown breast barring.

Conspicuous characteristics

- Scary and quickly takes to the air if disturbed.
- Rest on the water in large groups away from disturbance.
- In-flight birds fly in scattered skeins.

Call A musical double honk.

Nest A solitary nester which makes a bowl of twigs and grass, lined with feathers, usually on a mound with good visibility. Up to 5 white eggs are laid.
