Family Rallidae

Species *Porzana tabuensis*

Common name Spotless Crake

Status Native

Abundance Secretive but not uncommon

Size 600 mm (cf sparrow 145 mm, Marsh Crake 180 mm)

Habitat Confined generally to wetland habitat and lake verges. These are usually swamps which contain raupo (*Typha augustifolia*) with an over-storey of manuka (*Leptospermum scoparium*). On the offshore islands, and on the Poor Knights and Tiri Tiri Matangi Island in particular, they are forest dwellers living away from wetlands.

Worldwide range They have a wide distribution through the Philippines, New Guinea, Australia, New Zealand and the Pacific Islands to Tahiti. The genus *Porzana*, which totals 12 species worldwide, is found in many countries throughout the world but not on the continents of North and South America. New Zealand has two species, the Spotless Crake (*Porzana tabuensis*) and the Marsh Crake (*P. pusilla*). The New Zealand Spotless Crake is regarded as a fairly recent colonist but because of its very secretive habits, it is relatively unknown.

New Zealand range Throughout the North Island. In the South Island there are scattered populations in Marlborough, North Canterbury, Westland and Southland.

Description

Head and nape Black. Back and wings Dull brown. Underparts Dark grey. Eye Red with red eye-ring.

Conspicuous features

- Red of eye.
- Brown back and wings.

Conspicuous characteristics

- Will fly up from cover if startled by a metallic sound or an engine.
- Runs quickly when away from cover.

Call Sounds are varied. The most common is a "mook mook mook", often followed by a "brururur" bubbly type call. Also isolated "mook" sounds.

Nest On the ground in grass or rushes. Up to 4 pinkish-cream eggs are laid.
