EASTERN ROSELLA

Family Platycercidae
Species Platycercus eximius
Common name Eastern Rosella
Status Introduced. A cage-bird escape
Abundance Common in many areas
Size 320 mm (cf sparrow 145 mm)

Habitat In New Zealand a bird of both exotic and indigenous forests and of scattered vegetation.

Worldwide range A native of Australia where it is to be found in Tasmania, Victoria, New South Wales and south Queensland.

New Zealand range Now wide-spread through much of the North Island. A population is extending around Dunedin in the South Island.

Description

Head, neck and breast Bright red. **Lower cheeks and throat** White. **Wings** A mixture of yellow and black with blue primaries. **Underparts** Yellow. **Tail** Blue and green.

Conspicuous feature

The most brightly coloured of New Zealand's birds.

Conspicuous characteristics

- Usually seen flying in pairs.
- Can be a difficult bird to see once it has landed in a tree as it tends to move among the branches.

Call The usual call is a metallic "kwink" heard from high up in the forest. They also have an attractive musical song.

Nest Is found in cavities in trees. Up to 6 white eggs are laid.

Where to find - North Island

Expect it in many localities from Northland to Wellington. Populations are increasing and it is now a very common bird in Northland through the Waikato to Taranaki. Also spreading rapidly through the Manawatu towards Wellington.

Where to find - South Island

Expect it in Otago and spreading northwards.
