## **CALIFORNIA QUAIL**

Family Phasianidae

**Species** Lophortyx californicus

Common name California Quail

Status Introduced

**Abundance** Common

Size 250mm (cf sparrow 145 mm)

**Habitat** A bird of rough scrubland, and pastureland which contains sufficient wilderness to provide

nesting areas. It is a regular roadside species in areas of dense verges.

**Worldwide range** This is an imported game bird from North America which has established well.

**New Zealand range** Found in both islands away from forest and away from closely settled pastoral land. Absent from Fiordland and parts of Westland.

Description - male (above)

**Forehead** Grey to the eye. **Crown** Black, with a white edge band and a black crest feather which leans forward. **Face and chin** Black, edged with a white-curved throat collar. **Neck** Black and white spotting. **Wings** Dark grey. **Breast** Grey. **Underparts** Buff, feathers edged with black to give a horizontal scaly effect. Chestnut hue to middle abdomen. **Bill** Black. **Legs and feet** Grey.

### Description – female (below)

**Head, breast and upperparts** Duller than the male and tending to brown. **Crest feather** Shorter than male. **Underparts** Similar to male.

# **Conspicuous features**

- Black and white on the head of the male bird.
- Top-knot feather which separates it from the Brown Quail.
- Scaly pattern on abdomen.

#### **Conspicuous characteristics**

- Usually to be found in pairs or coveys.
- When disturbed birds run and then fly off with whirr of wings.
- Male birds will call for lengthy periods from a conspicuous perch.

Call A noisy tri-syllabic "ki kuu kuu".

**Nest** A hollow in grasses. Up to 13 cream, brown-blotched eggs are laid. Usually a late breeder with chicks being hatched from mid-December onwards.

#### Where to find - North and South Islands

North Island - Common in areas of scrubland and wilderness.

**South Island** – Common in open countryside with sufficient cover. Absent from Southland, Fiordland and southern parts of Westland.
