#### **INDIAN MYNA**

Family Sturnidae
Species Acridotheres tristis
Common name Myna
Status Introduced
Abundance Common

Size 240 mm (cf sparrow 145 mm, Starling 210 mm)

**Habitat** A bird of towns, roadside verges and pastureland, seldom venturing into forests, although occasionally seen along forest verges.

**Worldwide range** Afghanistan, Pakistan, India and Bangladesh. Introduced to many tropical countries.

**New Zealand range** North Island of New Zealand only. Largest populations are to the north of Lake Taupo but scattered numbers are found south to Wellington.

**Discussion** Mynas were introduced for pest control and many farmers claim they along with Starlings, are beneficial to pastures taking good numbers of pasture pests.

## Description

**Head and neck** Glossy black with a bare yellow patch behind eye. **Upperparts** Cinnamon-brown. **Wings** Brown with black primaries and a prominent white patch. **Underparts** Light brown. **Underwing** White. **Tail** Black with white tip and white undertail. **Bill, legs and feet** Yellow. **Eye-ring** Yellow.

# **Conspicuous features**

- White patches on wings.
- White on tail.
- Yellow bill

## **Conspicuous characteristics**

- Have a habit of feeding on tarmac roads in late afternoon, where they
  eat traffic-killed insect.
- Usually in pairs or in groups of up to ten.

**Call** Song, delivered by both sexes, is a loud bell-like assemblage of notes which is more conspicuous in the autumn months.

**Nest** A bundle of grass and sticks in a hole in a bank, or in an old building. Up to 5 greenish-blue eggs are laid.

### Where to find

**North Island only** – Very common in any roadside situation in the north of the North Island.

**Note** The Jungle Myna (*Acridotheres fuscus*), which is found in Fiji, is not found in New Zealand. Although similar to the Indian Myna, the Jungle Myna lacks the yellow eye surround and has a small crest on the forehead above bill. It is a smaller and neater bird than the Indian Myna.
