

Pukeko Porphyrio melanotus

NEW ZEALAND NATIVE, NOT THREATENED

Pukeko (swamphens) are large rails with sooty-black necks, back and upper-tail, and with a purplish-blue throat and breast. They have a prominent red bill and frontal shield, and long, reddish legs with long



spreading toes. The under-tail is white and is conspicuous as it is flicked up with each step. Pukeko inhabit lowland swamps and rough farmland, and have benefited from land clearance on mainland New Zealand, Chatham, and Pitt Islands.
